





Bird City Bastrop



Bastrop was one of the first cities in Texas to be named a Bird City!

Bird City Texas recognizes cities that promote bird-friendly habitat, including good water management, preserving green spaces, knowing the value of native plants in the habitat, and making buildings safe for birds. This includes turning off unnecessary bright lighting at night while birds are migrating and keeping cats inside.

There are many birds that call Bastrop home, and many more that migrate through on their way to breeding territories and wintering grounds; over 277 species have been reported here! This includes bald eagles, hummingbirds, cardinals, shorebirds, and painted buntings.

Bastrop has at least 6 species of woodpeckers and 4 species of owls!

Milk Carton Bird Feeder Adventure!

Welcome, Junior Park Rangers! Are you ready for a fun and eco-friendly project? Let's turn empty milk cartons into beautiful bird feeders that will attract colorful feathered friends to your backyard!

Materials Needed:

Empty milk or juice carton
Rope, cord, ribbon, or wire
Non-toxic acrylic paint
Paint brushes
Decorative items like twigs, leaves, pine cones, or recycled household materials
Craft or hot glue (with adult supervision)

Let's get started with the steps:

Step 1: Ask an adult to help you cut a large hole in the center of one side of the carton, starting a few inches from the bottom.

Step 2: Below the big hole, cut a small hole to poke a stick through. This will be a cozy perch for your bird friends to sit on while they eat.

Step 3: With adult help, cut two small holes on either side of the top of the carton. These holes are where you'll thread the rope or wire to hang your feeder.

Step 4: Now comes the fun part – painting and decorating! Use your imagination to transform your feeder into a cozy bird haven. Maybe it's a colorful cottage or a high-rise apartment building for our feathered friends.

Step 5: Once your masterpiece is dry, it's time to fill it with birdseed. Different birds like different kinds of seeds, so you can choose a mix or check out the Audubon Guide to Birdseed for some tips.

Step 6: Hang your feeder in a spot about five feet from the ground, where you can watch the birds come and go from your window.

Congratulations, Junior Park Rangers! You've created a wonderful bird feeder that not only helps our feathered friends but also adds beauty to your backyard. Keep an eye out for the amazing birds that will visit your feeder – it's like having your own bird sanctuary right at home!



Life in the Parks

Hi there, Junior Park Rangers!

I'm excited to tell you all about the amazing nature in the city parks of Bastrop, Texas. From my tall branches, I can see so many wonderful things. Early in the morning, bright red Northern Cardinals and noisy Blue Jays sing cheerful songs. Mockingbirds join in, copying other birds' tunes. Woodpeckers, like the Red-bellied and Downy Woodpecker, love to tap-tap-tap on my trunk, looking for tasty insects to eat. It's like a fun concert every day!

During the day, I see Eastern Cottontail Rabbits hopping through the grass, looking for yummy plants. Squirrels, both gray and fox, scamper up and down my trunk, playing chase and gathering acorns. Turtles love to sunbathe on logs in the Colorado river and watch the fish jump. Sometimes raccoons come out with their little black masks, searching for food. They're very curious and love to explore. In the evenings if you're lucky, you can see graceful deer come out to graze quietly. They are so beautiful to watch.

As night falls, a whole new world wakes up. Bats swoop through the air, catching insects on the go. Near the river, you can hear frogs and toads croaking. If you look carefully, you might spot a sneaky snake slithering through the grass, though they usually like to stay hidden. Trees like me, along with Live Oaks, Post Oaks, and Cedar Elms, provide homes for many creatures. Insects like butterflies and dragonflies dance around, adding to the park's beauty. All these amazing trees, insects, animals, and birds make our parks a special place.

Water Conservation

Where does our water come from?

The City of Bastrop currently has seven groundwater wells that supply all the water inside the City limits. This water is filtered, cleaned and treated before being pumped into the storage tanks for distribution to homes and businesses.





Did you know that every living thing on the planet needs water in order to survive?

Well, it's true! We need it to drink, wash, cook, and flush the toilet. Farmers need it to grow our food. Plants, trees, and animals need it to grow and survive.

The Earth has **A LOT** of water, but most of this water is not okay to drink or use because it is very salty ocean water. Since we all need water to live, it is up to each of us to make sure we have plenty to go around.

How can we save water for our future?

That's easy! We just need to stop wasting it. Saving water will save humans, animals, and plants. It will even save your parents money on their water utility bill!

Here are some ways YOU can save water instead of wasting it!

Don't Waste It!	Save It!
Never leave the water running while brushing your teeth.	Always turn the water off and use a cup filled with water while brushing your teeth.
Taking a bath uses about 70 gallons of water to fill the tub.	Taking a 5-minute shower only uses about 10-15 gallons of water.
Don't use the toilet as a trash can and never flush it for silly reasons.	Only flush the 3 P's down the toilet – P ee, P oop, and P aper (toilet paper).
Never play with the water or let it run while washing your hands.	You can save up to 6 gallons of water a day just by turning the tap off while you are washing your hands.
A washing machine uses up to 20 gallons of water, so never wash less than a full load.	Always make sure to wash a full load of clothes at a time.
Washing fruits and vegetables under running water wastes a lot of water.	Fill a large bowl with water to rinse your fruits and vegetables in, then pour the used water on your plants and flowers.
Never ignore a leaky faucet or toilet.	If you see a water leak, tell an adult so that it can be fixed right away!
You can use up to 27 gallons of water when washing dishes by hand.	Using a dishwasher and washing only full loads only uses 5 – 15 gallons of water.



Hi kids! It's Lolly again and I want to tell you about something very important: reduce, reuse, and recycle! These three words help us take care of our environment.



 Once your rocks are dry, ask an adult to help spray them with clear sealant to protect your art.


Hide and Seek:

Park Helpers

Friends like the Texas Audubon Society (tx.audubon.org) put up bird houses and share cool facts to make the park a happy home for birds. Texas Master Gardener (txmg.org) and Texas Master Naturalist (txmn.tamu.edu) volunteers help by planting gardens with native plants, building bird blinds where we can watch birds up close, and making trails for everyone to explore. These special areas bring in wildlife and make our parks beautiful places to visit and enjoy.
